Unfortunately, it was a difficult year for foaling for many of us. I do hope foaling and breeding go well this year, making up for such a tough 2023 breeding year. Hearing from Members and various vets, it was not a good breeding season for getting mares in foal. With all the fires, smoke and drought, it was a very challenging year. The price and availability of hay was another challenge.

Breeding and developing horses takes a lot of dedication and time, not to mention heart and money. I saw a lot of people reach out to help others last summer – it made me very proud of our community. We breeders have had such a stressful past few years and are due for a smooth and successful summer in 2024. I want to thank all the Members for their continued support and loyalty to Canadian Warmblood.

Otherwise 2023 was a relatively "normal" year in the CWHBA office, making it possible for us to take a deep breath. The previous few years had been pretty challenging, dealing with the high number of tracebacks, switching to a new registration system, and setting up our own office. The office has been very busy catching up on the CLRC backlog and it is now caught up.

With the Covid shutdowns ending, it felt like the first year in a long time that the Board has been able to get their bearings. It's so nice to be able to have our own office, taking some stress off our all-volunteer Board.

Our new registration system (Equis), and our updated website are well on track, improving our online services to Members. The online registration has been quite successful so far, with positive responses from Members. I personally found the online registration application has made registering a foal much easier than previously.

Working with the Delta Horse Equis technical support, Victoria has got most of the bugs worked out. Working with a European system has had a few translation issues to deal with. Migrating to the new system has been a complicated process and I am grateful for all the work Victoria has done on it. This system will make running Inspections easier and will help us to get the results out to mare owners in a more timely manner.

The past year has also been a very busy year for the Communications Committee. We plan to enhance the committee with a new Communications and Marketing Committee. It

will be important to have at least one representative from every Chapter. Please get in touch if you are interested in working on this.

We are always looking for Members to pitch in to help with various Committees and projects. Please note you do <u>not</u> need to be on the Board to volunteer. • Stallion Licensing and Stallion Performance Tests.

• World Breeding Federation Sport Horse

The World Breeding Federation Sport Horse General Assembly was held in Orlando, Florida on October 13th - 16th. Making it possible for National to have a great representation at the meeting. National was able to send 3 members, and as well the Alberta Chapter sent 1 representative.

It was a very busy meeting with some really interesting presentations, including a workshop. The workshop subject was "Welfare and Social License to Operate", which was presented as an introduction to the main topic, "is there a necessity for welfare-related, common studbook rules or guidelines for breeding programs (selections, performance testing, foal and mare events, etc), and if so, what should they be?"

There were 70 studbook representatives from 19 countries. This year's General Assembly is scheduled to take place in Portugal, co-hosted by the APCRS (Portuguese Sport Horse and Luso-Warmblood) and the Lusitano Studbook, October 12-15, 2024.

Looking forward to 2024, with our systems in place, I with the Board will be able to focus our efforts on a few important items that will further enhance the services to our members and the over all health of the industry.

First, we recently sent out a survey to help us get a good idea of our breeder profile and the trends and issues facing our industry. There has been no comprehensive study done since the last one by EC about 15 years ago.

Building on the information garnered we will be developing a strategic plan to help us better meet the needs of our members and improve our communciation and marketing functions.

We are of course excited to be sending an excellent team to the Young Breeders Championship in Denmark this year, coordinated by Maria Ardito. This is a wonderful program that well deserves our continued support.

Our regional chapters are the front line of the association. This year we will be engaging with them to examine ways that we can improve their finances and delivery of services.

Finally, with all the improvements in our service through the office and growth in our membership we will be looking for ways to involve more sponsors in our events and awards.
